Adult Learners Deliver a Landslide Victory to Patrick, Preserve Affordable Housing and Keep the Sales Tax

BOSTON, MA: Sales and alcohol taxes will prevail, affordable housing will be preserved, and Deval Patrick will win by a landslide if the votes of adult education students are any indicator of how the rest of the Commonwealth will vote on November 2. In October, hundreds of adult learners from adult education centers across the state participated in a mock election that simulates the three Massachusetts referendum questions and the statewide candidates.

Organized by the Massachusetts Coalition for Adult Education (MCAE), the mock election is a way to both motivate and prepare adult learners to vote in the real elections. According to Miranda Blanca a student at El Centro del Cardenal of the Catholic Charities, "It was a good idea to prepare us before the election. I had time to read everything in the Ballot. Now I've already decided for who and what to vote." Miranda added, "I'm now an informed voter."

Like an 18 year old female student, from an ABE program in Attleboro says, "The mock election was a good opportunity to learn about the candidates and think about the election before we had to make the real decisions." The student did not want to be identified because they are in an At Risk Youth Program.

Mariana, a 23 year-old single mother from Puerto Rico, taking classes at Holyoke Works said, ""My opinion about voting at first was that I felt like my opinion didn't matter, and I thought it wasn't important. Today in class I learned that voting is very important. Voting can help our community, economy, and businesses." She added "Now that I know how voting works I'm definitely going to register, and I'm going to vote."

Being registered to vote is no guarantee that people know much about the referendum questions or candidates or have taken time to consider the pros and cons of various issues. Dwight Jarret, an ABE teacher from ABCD Learning Works in Boston, said "The students enjoyed researching the candidates online and discussing the proposed initiatives." The mock elections also provided an opportunity for immigrants who cannot vote to feel part of the elections. When they do obtain citizenship they will be that much better prepared for the real thing.
